日本 トリイ オアシス シュライン クラブ 身 体 障 害 児 童 治 療 計 画

日本 トリイ オアシス シュライン クラブは,終戦後,初の社会福祉事業推進を目的として,1949 年に設立れました。

それまでは、相模 シュライン クラブ・東京 シュライン クラブ・横浜 シュライン クラブが中心となって個々に身体障害児童のお世話に当っておりましたが、当クラブの組織誕生をみて、また第一回記念事業の成功とその治療計画の推進により全国各地に続々と支部が設立され、現在では 1,846 人の新会員が加入しております。

会員達は身体不自由な子供達が、一日も早く健康を回復し、楽しい生活がおくれることを願って、これまでと同様に現在も事業計画に沿ってお世話しております。

今までに約295人の子供達が3ヵ月から2年間入院治療し、300人以上がマッサージ・足の矯正・又矯正靴をうけるため通院しました。この子供達は小児マヒの後遺症として長い間内反足とか、先天性股関節脱臼などで苦しんでいました。整形外科手術は日本でも著名な東京聖路加病院の外科医服部 武博士のもとでおこなわれ、ゆきとどいた看護をうけ、それぞれ退院し、現在では楽しい日々を送り、りっぱな市民となっております。

当クラブは、また米国のシュライン計画にならい、大やけどの皮フ後遺症を治療するため、これもまた日本で有数の外科医、東京大学附属病院の大森清一博士が、植皮手術等のむづかしい治療にあたっております。これら東京の医療機関の他に、青森県三沢市はまなす学園・広島赤十字病院・韓国のカソリック メディカル センターなど、各地の子供達にも恵まれた環境の中で治療がおこなえるよう、治療機関を用意してあります。これらの治療計画は、当クラブの会員と関係各方面からの暖いご援助のもとにおこなわれております。治療をうける子供さんは、国籍、宗教は問いません。14才未満で、多額の治療費負担困難な、恵まれない子供さんならば、どなたでも援助させていただきます。

THE T.O.S.C.J. CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S PROGRAM IN JAPAN

The Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs, composed of approximately 1000 Shriners living in Japan and other parts of the world, have banded together to implement a program of assisting crippled children to regain their health, so that they can enjoy the life which is their rightful heritage. To date, approximately 325 patients have been hospitalized for periods lasting from three month to two years. Over 300 have received out-patient treatment such as massage, corrective shoes, braces and artificial limbs.

These unfortunate children were suffering from either clubbed feet, curved spines, tuberculosis of bones and joints, infantile paralysis, bow legs, congenital hip and such diseases and deformities that require orthopedic surgery or other methods of correction.

At present the Torii Oasis Shrine is placing its orthopedic cases in the St. Luke's International Hospital in Tokyo; the Seventh Day Adventist Hospital and the Japanese Police Hospital. Certain other disabling diseases are also given consideration.

Since the Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs' Hospital Program follows the same plan as the Shrine in the United States the use of plastic surgery and skin grafts to replace scar tissue resulting from severe burns or scalds are now included. Dr. Seiichi Omori of the Tokyo University Hospital and Dr. Nobuyuki Shioya, outstanding plastic surgeons in Japan, are performing skillful restoration of badly scarred and mutilated tissue for our patients.

This hospital program is being financed by the Shriners in Japan with the assistance of their friends.

To be eligible for admittance to a hospital under the Torii Oasis Shrine Program, a child must be under 15 years and its parents unable to pay for treatment.

There is no reference to race, color or religion when submitting an application. The pictures on some of the following pages show the children who are at present undergoing treatment.

BRIEF HISTORY OF NILE TEMPLE

Nile Temple, one of the younger Temples, dates back to July 14, 1908, when a petition signed by 466 Nobles of the Mystic Shrine was presented to the Imperial Council Session in St. Paul, Minnesota.

On July 15, 1908 the dispensation was granted.

The first formal meeting of the petitioners for Nile Temple was held in the Elks Hall, Alaska Building, Seattle, September 16, 1908. The first Ceremonial was held in the Moore Theatre, December 2, 1908 with 122 Candidates and about 1,000 Nobles present.

Under the chosen title of "Nile Temple", a charter was granted at the Imperial Council Session on June 9, 1909 in Louisville, Kentucky.. the largest Temple chartered in the history of the Order up to that time.


The famous slogan, "Smile With Nile", was coined by the late Past Potentate John L. McLean, for the Imperial Council Session held in Seattle in 1915.

Today, Nile Temple is the 12th largest Temple in Shrinedom with 15 Shrine Clubs in Washington and 9 in Alaska.

It is the most traveled. In the summer of 1909, as the excitement of the Gold Rush Days was fading, Nile made the first pilgrimage to Nome, Alaska. In 1914, 110 Nobles and their wives boarded the S/S Minnesota, traveling 72 days and made the first pilgrimage to the Orient. In 1949, Nile Conducted the first post-way Ceremonial, held in the Union Club in Tokyo, was named after one of Nile's distinguished members, "The Douglas MacArthur Ceremonial". The year 1971 marks Nile's 18th pilgrimage to the Far East.

Nile's Headquarters Building is in the heart of the Seattle Civic Center adjacent to the Famous Space Needle. Nile also owns its own Country Club of 100 acres on the shores of Lake Ballinger, 12 minutes from the city via the new Freeway. Here the members and their families enjoy golf, the lake front, swimming and family picnics beneath the towering firs.

Nobles, the latchstring is always out and a warm welcome awaits.



MASONIC TEMPLE, TOKYO, JAPAN

The Tokyo Masonic Building stands on one of the highest hills in Tokyo as a monument to the efforts of Masons in Japan. This beautiful building, with its grounds, library, restaurant and swimming pool, is a well-known landmark in the city of Tokyo. The properties are owned by a foundation erected jointly by Tokyo Masonic Lodge No. 2 on the roll of the Grand Lodge of Japan and the Scottish Rite Bodies of Japan. The properties are administered by a perpetuating Board of Trustees consisting of six members, three of whom are nominated by Tokyo Masonic Lodge No.2 and three by the Scottish Rite Bodies. Portions of the buildings are rented as offices and living quarters. Masonic organizations benefit to the extent of having their meeting quarters here. The income of the building is dedicated to charity. A ward for children, consisting of twenty five beds, is fully maintained from this income. This ward is at St. Luke's Hospital in Tokyo, which is the finest medical institution in the Far East.

The organizations which meet in the Tokyo Masonic Building are Tokyo Masonic Lodge No. 2, Yuai Lodge No. 11 and Harmony Lodge No. 18 under the Grand Lodge of Japan; Sinim Lodge under the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts; Kanto Lodge No. 143 under the Grand Lodge of the Philippines; the four Scottish Rite Bodies; Tokyo Royal Arch Chapter No. 1; Royal and Select Masters Council No. 1; Tokyo Commandery Knights Templar No. 1; Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan; the Eastern Star; the DeMolay and the Rainbow Girls. The Grand Lodge of Japan also has its headquarters in this building. For American Forces stationed in Japan, the Tokyo Masonic Building has been their Masonic home away from home.
