On behalf of the Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan we extend a warm and hearty welcome to Illustrious Noble George H. Taylor of Islam Temple, his Divan and Their Ladies.

This year marks the 22nd Anniversary of the Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan. During the past 22 years the TOSCI has made significant contributions to Shrinedom, Humanity and Society.

To Shrinedom, by hosting 22 ceremonials, during which 1846 candidates have been created into the Nobility. This does not include the present class.

To Humanity, by restoring their inherent right to walk and lead a normal life to 295 children requiring hospitalization and over 300 additional out patients requiring braces orthopedic shoes, massages, etc.

To Society, by returning to the numerous villages, farms and cities children who will ultimately grown into useful citizens and leaders with a firm belief that where there is hope there is success.

All our children have returned home walking on their own two feet as living examples of results produced by love, faith and action. These positive results have indeed been beneficial in promoting understanding in villages and communities that results

are produced by love, truth and immediate action and not by timeless promises.

Membership in the TOSJC presently numbers 938. We have 83 Temples represented on our rolls. There are 11 Shrine Luncheon Clubs throughout Japan whose members make up the Executive Committee.

Children are referred by individual Shriners to their local club. The funds come from individual donations and special events sponsored by the local clubs and the Torii. The TOSJC Executive Committee, through a standardized procedure reviews all applications and preliminary medical reports before authorizing admission.

Unfortunately, not all referrals can be admitted as we strictly enforce and maintain the intent and spirit of the charity that is publicly associated with Shrinedom, which is providing for "the treatment and care of children afflicted with crippling diseases, deformities, or dangerously acute burns." Our children are treated and cared for in the most modern and efficient medical institutions available.

To you young Novice, shortly you shall be a Noble, created by a time honored ritual of instruction garnished with pagentry and solemnity which may lead you to believe that being a Shriner is the ultimate goal a Mason can reach. Not so! Your first duty as a Shriner is, has been and all ways will be to support your Blue Lodge. Welcome to Islam Temple and the Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan.

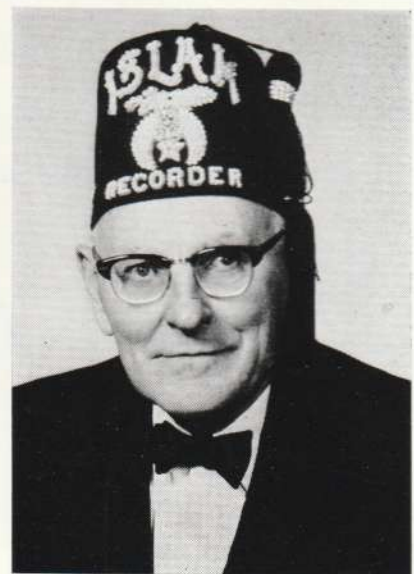

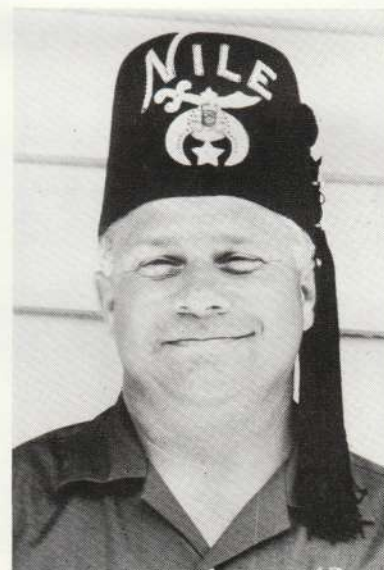

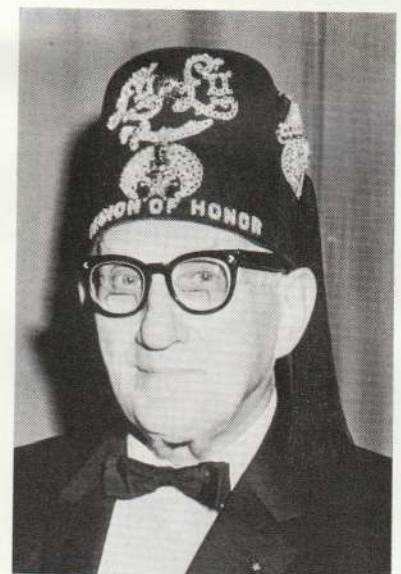

My legs were crooked—born that way, I couldn't move around;

Let's try those new straight legs of yours and see how well you've done."

I don't know how they did it—I'm not much on doctor's talk;
I only know I used to crawl—and now! See, I can walk;
I wonder why my mother cried when I went home so straight and fine!
But through her tears I heard her say, "God bless the Shrine!"

The Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan Crippled Children's Program

The Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan was organized in 1949 for the purpose of hosting the first post war ceremonial in Japan. The nucleus of the organization being the Sagami Shrine Club, Tokyo Shrine Club and the Yokohama Shrine Club whose members prior to this time individually and personally sponsored the hospitalization of crippled children. With the success of that ceremonial during which 157 Shriners were created by Nile Temple and with the TOSCJ as the hub of managing an organized hospital program, Shrine Clubs sprang up throughout Japan. Most of them survived, some didn't, but all contributed to perpetuate the dignity, character and humane cause of Shrinedom.

Subsequent ceremonials in Japan have created a total of 1846 Shriners all of whom were or are members of the TOSCJ, aiding in its program of assisting crippled children to regain their health, so they can enjoy life which is their rightful heritage.

Approximately 295 patients were hospitalized for periods lasting from three months to two years. Over 300 have received out-patient treatment such as massage, corrective shoe, braces and artificial limbs.

These unfortunate children were suffering from either clubbed feet, curved spines, tuberculosis of bones and joints, infantile paralysis, bow legs, congenital hip dislocation, burns and such diseases and deformities that require orthopedic surgery or other methods of correction.

At present the Torii Oasis is placing its orthopedic cases in the St. Luke's International Hospital in Tokyo. This hospital is the finest in the Far East and under the professional and kindly care of Dr. Takeshi Hattori, Orthopedic Surgeon, our children are being returned to their homes to enjoy life and become useful citizens.

Since the Torii Oasis Shrine Club's Hospital Program follows the same plan as the Shrine in the United States the use of plastic surgery and skin graft to replace scar tissue resulting from severe burns or scalds is now included. Dr. Seiichi Omori of the Tokyo University Hospital, the outstanding plastic surgeon in Japan is performing skillful restoration of badly scarred tissue for our patients.

In addition to these specialized institutions in Tokyo it has been necessary to admit patients in hospitals away from Tokyo such as the Hamanasu Gakuen in Misawa, Aomori prefecture, the Hiroshima Red Cross Hospital and the Catholic Medical Center in Seoul, Korea. These institutions meet the exacting high standards expected by the Shrine to insure a complete and successful operation in pleasant surroundings.

This hospital program is being financed by the members of the Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan with the assistance of their friends.

To be eligible for admittance to a hospital under the Torii Oasis Shrine Program, a child must be under 14 years and its parents unable to pay for treatment.

There is no reference to race, color or religion when submitting an application. The pictures on some of the following pages show the children who have been helped by our program.

If you know of any crippled child whom orthopedic hospitalization can help, feel free to contact any Shriner or call the Shrine Office, 431-4121 Ext. 206 and the Hospital Committee will carry on from there.

Torii Oasis Crippled Children's Program

日本 トリイ オアシス シュライン クラブ 身体障害児童治療計画

日本 トリイ オアシス シュライン クラブは、終戦後、初の社会福祉事業推進を目的として、1949年に設立されました。

それまでは、相模 シュライン クラブ・東京 シュライン クラブ・横浜 シュライン クラブが中心となって個々に身体障害児童のお世話に当っておりましたが、当クラブの組織誕生をみて、また第一回記念事業の成功とその治療計画の推進により全国各地に続々と支部が設立され、現在では1,846人の新会員が加入しております。

会員達は身体不自由な子供達が、一日も早く健康を回復し、楽しい生活がおくれることを願って、これまでと同様に現在も事業計画に沿ってお世話しております。

今までに約295人の子供達が3カ月から2年間入院治療し、300人以上がマッサージ・足の矯正・又矯正靴をうけるため通院しました。この子供達は小児マヒの後遺症として長い間内反足とか、先天性股関節脱臼などで苦しんでいました。整形外科手術は日本でも著名な東京聖路加病院の外科医服部 武博士のもとでおこなわれ、ゆきとどいた看護をうけ、それぞれ退院し、現在では楽しい日々を送り、りっぱな市民となっております。

当クラブは、また米国のシュライン計画にならい、大やけどの皮フ後遺症を治療するため、これもまた日本で有数の外科医、東京大学附属病院の大森清一博士が、植皮手術等のむづかしい治療にあたっております。これら東京の医療機関の他に、青森県三沢市はまなす学園・広島赤十字病院・韓国のカソリック メディカル センターなど、各地の子供達にも恵まれた環境の中で治療がおこなえるよう、治療機関を用意しております。これらの治療計画は、当クラブの会員と関係各方面からの暖いご援助のもとにおこなわれております。

治療をうける子供さんは、国籍、宗教は問いません。14才未満で、多額の治療費負担困難な、恵まれない子供さんならば、どなたでも援助させていただきます。

恵まれない多くの身体障害児童が元気になられ、退院され楽しい社会生活が送られるようになられることは、私達の無上の喜びです。もし、このような手術、治療により救われるからだの不自由なお子様をご存じでしたら、是非ご連絡下さい。医療委員会が、ご相談に応じます。

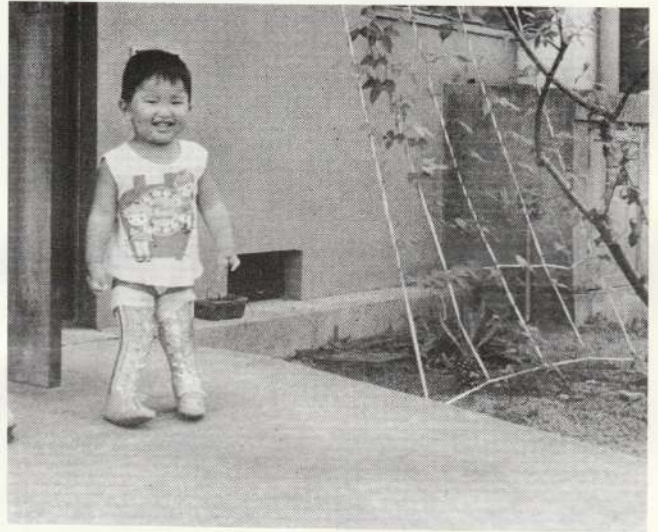

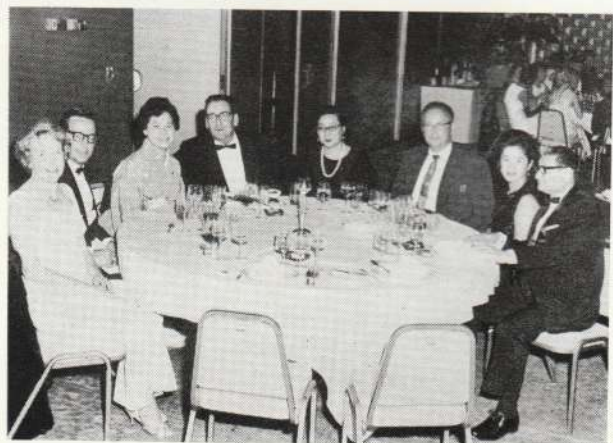

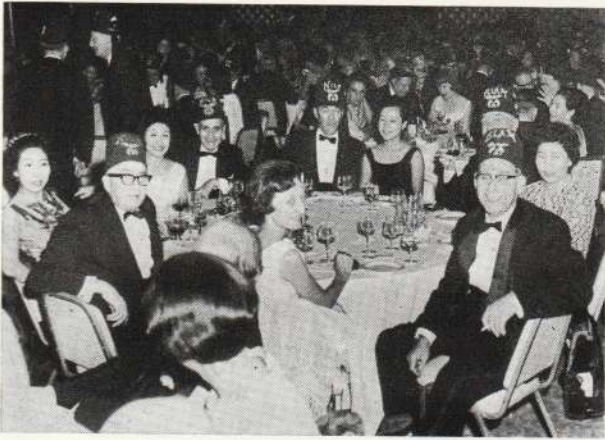

HISTORY . . . ISLAM TEMPLE

A. A. O. N. M. S.

On March 6, 1883, Most Illustrious Grand Potentate, Walter M. Fleming, 33°, granted a Dispensation to a group of thirty-second degree Masons to open a Temple in San Francisco, State of California, under the title of Islam Temple.

Thus did Islam Temple become the first Shrine Temple to be granted a charter west of the Rocky Mountains, and from its territory, six other Temples have subsequently been formed in California.

Islam Temple was duly constituted and its first session held under the Dispensation on May 11, 1883, and a committee appointed to secure the necessary paraphernalia, etc., for its use. Meetings were held during the months of May, June and July 1883, but the Temple had no regular place of meeting until August, when the use of the Asylum of Golden Gate Commandery was obtained, and where sessions of the Temple were held. On August 23, 1883, the first Ceremonial was held during the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. Many of those who attended the conclave were Nobles from other Temples and assisted in putting on the work.

Islam Temple remained active through all the years, taking time out only during the earthquake of 1906, a Ceremonial having been planned for the day of the earthquake. In 1917, the Temple building at 650 Geary Street was started, and has been the home of Islam Temple for all these years.

In the petition for Dispensation appears the names: Timothy Hopkins, William T. Coleman, E. W. Newhall, Charles L. Field, and many others who are closely associated with the financial and business progress of San Francisco.

In its early days the Shrine was often called "the playground of Masonry" but in 1920 an idea was presented to the Imperial Council, by the then Past Imperial Potentate, Freeland Kenderick, which changed the whole course of the Shrine. He conceived the idea that the Shrine should engage in some great humanitarian effort for the benefit of mankind, and introduced a resolution to the Imperial Council Session in Portland, Oregon, that the organization dedicate its activities to the work of crippled children. The resolution passed, and a committee of seven members was appointed to make a study and report back to the Imperial Council Session, to be held in Des Moines, Iowa, the following year. One of the seven members appointed was the late John D. McGilvray, Past Potentate of Islam Temple in the years 1917 and 1919 and from its inception, Chairman of the Board, of the San Francisco Unit of the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children.

Islam Temple is a member of the Western Shrine Association, consisting of the Temples in Arizona, California, New Mexico, Nevada, Utah and Hawaii.

It is but natural therefore, that the history of Islam Temple would not be complete without mention of the East West Football game, appropriately called, "Football's Finest Hour", with the proceeds benefiting the Shriners' Hospitals for Crippled Children, located within the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Masons of California and Hawaii.

Prior to 1925, in San Francisco, teams from Islam Temple, and the Elks played a baseball game, with the proceeds going to the charities of the two fraternities. Captain E. Jack Spaulding, U.S.N., retired presented the idea of a football game as having more appeal to the spectators, and visioned an "All Star" game comprising the top players of the country.

Islam's Potentate, H. K. McKevitt, enthusiastically agreed, and Nobles Ernest West and William H. Woodfield, Jr. sponsored the motion that gave McKevitt, authority to spend \$ 10,000 to promote the game. Noble Mervyn Goodman made the motion that the proceeds go to the S. F. Unit, Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. Members of Islam Temple, then met with the Bay Area sportswriters and obtained their unqualified support to the game and its cause.

At this stage, William M. Coffman, a Noble of Islam Temple was officially designated as head of the committee to entertain and care for visiting players, but he gradually accepted more and more responsibility until he suddenly found himself in complete charge of the entire operation.

As might have been expected, Potentate McKevitt and Noble Coffman, encountered no end of obstacles in organizing the first game. Less than a month before the game it necessary to double the budget. Ticket sales were slow, some people felt the game would never be held, and even after all the details were worked out, rain threatened to upset all their efforts.

The skies cleared however, the game went on as scheduled. On December 26, 1925 a crowd of 25,000 assembled at old Ewing Field, to witness the first East West game, which netted the Shriner's Hospitals for Crippled Children, San Francisco Unit, the sum of \$ 25,000. The Shrine East-West game was on its way to becoming the most famous and most worthy "bowl" game of time all.

A total of 42 East West games have been played since that first one at Ewing Field, and over \$ 5,000,000 has been realized for this great cause. Each year the game, played at Kezar Stadium, in San Francisco, has packed in 60,000 people to see the game, the pageantry and to contribute to the wonderful cause for which it is played.

Coaches are selected from the finest college teams in the nation, and they in turn invite the college players to participate in the game. Both the coaches and the young men who play in the game forego their Christmas holidays to come to San Francisco. Each squad consists of 28 players.

Both squads make a visit to the hospital shortly after they arrive for the game. The emotional impact on the players is difficult to describe. They are greeted by a sea of smiling faces, but as they look beyond the faces and see the twisted little bodies in full-length casts, or arms or legs in traction or in splints, right then and there they find out just what the East West Game is all about. Each player is imbued with a new spirit, and learns the true meaning of the East West Game slogan, "Strong Legs Run that Weak Legs May Walk".

We cannot help but pay tribute to the Nobles who had the vision and courage to make the game a reality in 1925. As plans are being finalized for the 43rd Annual East West Game, another great change is in the making. This years game will be played in Candlestick Park, home of the San Francisco Giants Baseball Team, a move which the East West Football Committee believes is in keeping with their constant endeavor to make the game attractive to the public. Candlestick will provide ample parking facilities, bigger and better seats for the spectators, and more seats between the goal lines, always a welcome addition.

Islam Temple, the Mother Temple of California, with a membership of over 9400, looks back over the 84 years of its existence and proudly recalls its distinguished Nobles and the part it has taken in Shrinedom in North America.

Five times it has played host to the Imperial Council Sessions, (1902, 1922, 1932, 1946, 1966). In 1952 and 1963 to the Shrine Directors of North America, and in 1954 to the Western Shrine Association. Over the years Islam has made seven (7) Ceremonial Pilgrimages to the Far East, 1923, 1928, 1935, 1948, 1958, 1961, 1964 and will make the eighth (8) pilgrimage in the fall of

1967.

Two Past Potentates of Islam, Charles L. Field, and William H. Woodfield, Jr., have been elected Imperial Potentates of the Shrine of North America.

Islam's colorful Units, Patrol, Band, Section Crew, Arabians, Greeters, Legion of Honor, Temple Guard Mounted Patrol and Chanters, along with various Shrine Club groups number over 500 uniformed marching Nobles.

MASONIC TEMPLE, TOKYO, JAPAN

The Tokyo Masonic Building stands on one of the highest hills in Tokyo as a monument to the efforts of Masons in Japan. This beautiful building, with its grounds, library, restaurant and swimming pool, is a well-known landmark in the city of Tokyo. The properties are owned by a foundation elected jointly by Tokyo Masonic Lodge No. 2 on the roll of the Grand Lodge of Japan and the Scottish Rite Bodies of Japan. The properties are administered by a perpetuating Board of Trustees consisting of six members, three of whom are elected by Tokyo Masonic Lodge No.2 and three by the Scottish Rite Bodies. Portions of the buildings are rented as offices and living quarters. Masonic organizations benefit to the extent of having their meeting quarters here. The income of the building is dedicated to charity. A ward for children, consisting of twenty five beds, is fully maintained from this income. This ward is at St. Luke's Hospital in Tokyo, which is the finest medical institution in the Far East.

The organizations which meet in the Tokyo Masonic Building are Tokyo Masonic Lodge No. 2, Yuai Lodge No. 11 and Harmony Lodge No. 18 under the Grand Lodge of Japan; Sinim Lodge under the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts; Kanto Lodge No. 143 under the Grand Lodge of the Philippines; the four Scottish Rite Bodies; Tokyo Royal Arch Chapter No. 1; Royal and Select Masters Council No. 1; Tokyo Commandery Knights Templar No. 1; Torii Oasis Shrine Clubs of Japan; the Eastern Star; the DeMolay and the Rainbow Girls. The Grand Lodge of Japan also has its headquarters in this building. For American Forces stationed in Japan, the Tokyo Masonic Building has been their Masonic home away from home.

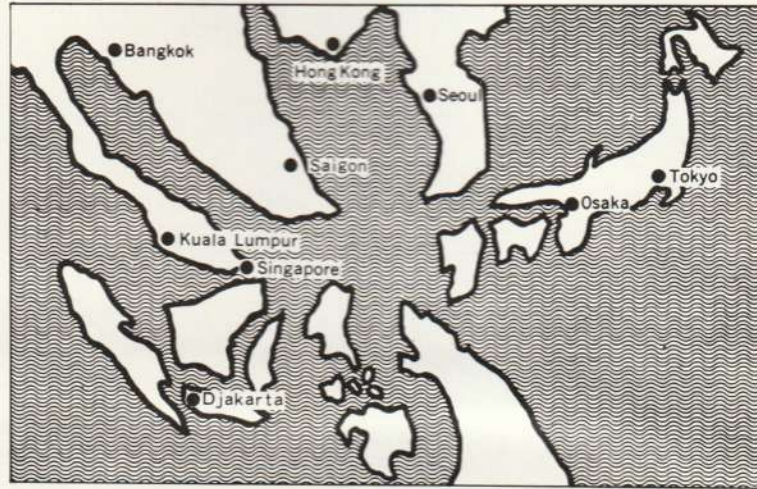
